I've been reflecting recently on facing hardship and how it impacts our faith life. A lot of this has been driven by my own experience this fall. A lot has happened, and even though I won't go into details here it has given me a lot to reflect on in my relationship with God. All the typical questions come up -- Why me? Am I being tested? What am I supposed to learn from this? What is going on, God?

As I have been wrestling with those questions and facing certain challenges, one thing that has consistently got me through is community. Community has shown up to support me in a myriad of ways. Community has supported me through hugs and kind words, through encouragement to take time off and rest as I have needed it, through helping me with work when I have had to miss some events, and helping me with tasks at home when I have struggled to find the time to complete them. Community has lifted me up when I have needed it most. You have all been the community that has lifted me up when I have needed it.

Community is a gift from God -- we all need it, and we have literally been created to function this way. In the book of Genesis, God says, "it is not good for [Adam] to be alone..." so God creates another human being and creates community for the very first time. We are not meant to go through life alone, despite what our culture and wider world would have us believe. Even so, community is one thing that is majorly lacking among so many people right now. Studies have shown that we are one of the loneliest cohorts of people right now, and the impacts of this are being felt on a larger society wide basis. A New York Times article written by the Surgeon General Vivek Murthy back in April 2023 gave some key actions that we can do to help each other heal from loneliness. He listed things like serving other people, talking with friends and coworkers for 15 minutes each day, or simply introducing ourselves to our neighbors. These are not super strenuous tasks and they do not take up tons of time. They are also things that happen at churches and in faith communities on a regular basis.

Now I am not going to guilt people into coming to church if you have not for a while. That is not my style, and frankly it is not loving. What I will say, though, is that if you are feeling lonely and seeking community, know that there is a place for you here and there is hope to end your loneliness. I pray that you find yourself receiving support from community when you need it and knowing that there is a community here at Bethlehem who will love and support you always.

### **Family Faith Formation Updates**

#### Who are your safeties? For whom are you a safety?

Both before and since the Covid-19 pandemic, mental health has been an important issue, especially among young people. Too many suffer alone and the stigma of mental illness remains, even if mental health is just another form of health.

Later this month, we will host a new youth milestone called Brave Conversations. We will invite 5th-8th grade youth and their parents to discuss an important but difficult topic together with facilitation from Pr. Jacie and me. Our first Brave Conversation will be about—you guessed it!— mental health and suicide.

One of the tools we will use together is called "Blessed Youth: A Survival Guide". Tucked inside the guide is a place to write down three people who are "safeties" for each young person. These are three adults to reach out to when things get hard or you are filled with despair or suicidal thoughts. This is an important exercise, but not only for our youth. So I ask you, dearest Star readers, who are your safeties? For whom might you be a safety? Who are the people who lift you and support you in difficult times? Who can come to you when they need a listening ear or a person to hold space for them? I encourage you to write them down as we will ask our young people to do. I pray our youth can find the safety they need in difficult moments, but I pray you can, too.



Highlights from the **Monthly Council Meeting**

**New BLC Members:** Welcome to the following new BLC members who were approved by the Council: Gloria Butler, Megan Monahan, Dustin and Kortni Pizel, Bob and Peggy Sorenson and David Tap. New Council Member: Josie Lust was approved to fill the vacant Member-at-Large Council position created by the resignation of Jessica Auel. Her term will run to the spring of 2025. November 19 Semi-Annual Meeting Agenda: The agenda for the November 19 semi-annual meeting was approved. Meeting topics will include: A. Approval of 2024 budget proposal; B. 2022 Financial Review Report Approval; C. Strategic Plan Goals Update; D. 2023-24 BLC Board & Committee Goals. We need 75 members present for a quorum to complete business. Put November 19 on your calendars for the 10:45-11:45 a.m. meeting after Sunday worship in the dining room. 2024 BLC Annual Budget Recommendation: The proposed 2024 annual budget was approved for recommendation to the congregation at the November 19 semi-annual meeting. The proposed budget will be available on the narthex kiosk on Sunday, November 5 and presented for review/discussion with Council members on Sunday, November 12 at the 10:45 a.m. adult forum. Financial Review Report Update: Progress continues on finalizing a standardized annual financial review report form. Council members will study this for future approval. Finances: The September 20 end-of-month financial report was not completed for this meeting. The monthly deficit has increased by an additional \$10,000+ from the August 31-\$50,844.35 deficit. 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter member giving statements have been mailed. Check this summary and contact Elizabeth Ruiz with any questions. **WELCOME:** All is going well with the Cruz family this fall as they develop new friendships in the community. Plan on attending the November 9 evening celebration at Christ the King of all the good Cruz news! Check the BLC website or contact the church office to RSVP. Attendance is limited to 350 members of the 5 sponsoring churches. Time to celebrate! Strategic Goal 3 Update: "We will foster a climate of respect and appreciation to nurture the differing perspectives among our members and the greater Mankato community." Objectives focusing on acknowledging contributions and service to Bethlehem; updating the church conflict resolution policy and inviting community members and organization to present diverse voices and perspectives to our congregation were reviewed. We have taken positive steps on these objectives! Community Leader Interviews: Council president Jason Bruns, secretary Bob Ihrig and Member-at-Large Amanda Neubert reported on their interviews with community leaders. Issues addressed included housing, transportation, food insecurity, child care, parenting support, teen foster care support, youth mental health, student study support, teen collaborative activities in the classroom and increasing community activities for youth. Community leaders are interviewed to identify major issues facing the community and how Bethlehem can help to address these. **Youth Activities:** Expect to see our youth more involved in Wednesday night worship activities. Youth leaders of area churches have been surveyed about how they are engaging youth in their ministries to enhance our own youth program. Crossroads Campus Ministry: Pastor Jenna Couch has come on board as the new campus pastor. BLC Men's Group served Lunchfor-a-Buck on October 3 to 70 students and university staff. **Stewardship:** Check your mail for the 2024 annual stewardship campaign letter and commitment form. Give prayerful consideration to your financial support of Bethlehem. Pledges may be returned during worship services with a deadline of October 29. Help us maintain all the good we do as a church for our members and the community. Next Council Meeting: Tuesday, November 21.

Notes from the Community & Global Missions



Our mission partner for November is The Reach Youth Resource Center, a program of Lutheran Social Services of Minnesota. The organization serves youth ages 16-24 who are unhoused or at risk of homelessness. It was formed in 2011, originally as a drop-in center, but now with expanded services that continue to grow. The Reach is housed on Liberty Street on the Bethlehem campus. Their focus is on providing basic necessities, working with various housing and shelter options, preparing youth for employment and independent living, providing support and education, and offering recreational activities. Over the years, The Reach has served over 5300 youth, had more than 28,000 visits to the Resource Center, and provided more than 30,800 meals! They are committed to providing youth with the resources needed to live healthy, independent, and productive lives with self-reliance and community connection being emphasized.
