

Not too long ago I was given a copy of a devotional about Easter. It used the metaphor of biscuits to talk about Easter and resurrection. As well as having good baking advice (spoiler—baking powder is your friend when making biscuits), it got me thinking a lot about hope.

Hope is one of many themes that we can find ourselves reflecting on at Easter Time. I have found myself dwelling on it quite frequently over the past several years actually. There are so many things in the world that can discourage us from having hope. Many people, especially from my generation and younger, seem to have begun to lose hope for the future instead choosing to live with thinly veiled cynicism laced with sarcasm. Just look at various memes on the internet if you want to see an example of what I am talking about. How do you find hope in the midst of a planet who is in trouble, a country that feels like its government is falling apart, and neighbor is fighting against neighbor?

Our faith reminds us to not lose hope, though. The Apostle Paul literally writes this in his letter of 2 Corinthians. Paul writes that we should "not lose heart. Though outwardly we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day. For our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all. So we fix our eyes not on what is seen, but on what is unseen, since what is seen is temporary, but what is unseen is eternal." In other words, Paul reminds us to keep having hope because even when we struggle we can find hope in God's promises. It may seem strange or even impossible at times to hold on to hope that God will bring about the great Kingdom of God that is promised in scripture. Many people in the world would even call it foolish and pointless to hold on to hope for that. That is perhaps a gift that we can offer to the world, though — to remind people of what it looks like to hold on to hope in a world that can feel so hopeless for so many. After all, when we have felt lost and helpless in our lives, we can probably think of the people who held on to hope for us when it felt impossible for us to do so on our own.

So during this Easter Time, I pray that you are able to feel hope in some way. I also pray that you can hold on to that hope however you are able. Maybe by doing that it can be a gift and inspiration to others who need that hope, too.  $\sim Pr.$  Jacie



Welcome New Members: The Council approved & welcomed the following new members to Bethlehem: Gary & Lavonne Phillips; Gary & Jane Petersen; Shelly & Erik Olson; Rachael Jaeger; Maxine Boyer and Jamie Rivers.

Financial Report: Continued positive news as February 28 general fund balance finished at +\$1,089.29. General fund offering was \$53,022.51 more than budgeted for the month. With another advance principal payment, the mortgage balance is now \$480,454.99. An additional advance payment to be made in March/ April.

REACH Lease Update: Expanded lease recommended for REACH for use of Youth Room space to hold individual confidential client meetings. To be presented to LSS for approval.

April 21 Semi-Annual Meeting: Agenda approved for meeting. Primary focus to be annual reports; approval of new Council, board, committee members; and updates on strategic plan and WELCOME project. Join us at 10:45 a.m. in the dining room for coffee, conversation & action!

2024 Ballot: 11 positions remain to be filled on the Council (2), Endowment (1), Finance (5), Stewardship (1), Welcome & Inclusion (1) & Youth (1) boards. Council Annual Report: 2023-24 Council annual report reviewed & approved for semi-annual meeting presentation along with annual reports from 12 boards & committees.

**2024 Personnel Committee:** Mary Bliesmer approved to complete 2 years of a committee term resulting from a resignation. Planning underway for June BLC annual lay staff performance reviews with review questions approved and review teams organized.

Strategic Plan Update: Positive progress on Goal #3 "We will foster a climate of respect and appreciation to nurture the differing perspectives among our members and the greater Mankato community" was reported with details shared on the 3 supporting objectives and practices.

WELCOME Update: Much is happening with Cruz family on driver's permit testing, plans for summer Bible camp participation, work permission application & waiting on asylum application.

Connections Shelter: 3 candidates interviewed for director to replace resigning Erica Koser with positive outcomes. Board of directors to conduct follow-up interviews during next week & finalize hiring decision.

Kato Sleep-Out Fundraiser: 4 BLC members including Pr. Jacie, Amy Haigh, Ben & Danielle Johnson to sleep out on April 26 to raise funds for Connections. \$1,500 contributed thus far from BLC members. Contact Bob Ihrig with your dollars for Connections. Next Council Meeting: Tuesday, April 16.

Our April Mission Partner is the WELCOME Committee, a combined effort of five local ELCA congregations including BLC. The mission of the committee is to welcome refugees into the community. The initial family sponsored by the group is the Cruz family from Nicaragua. Areac and Andrea have two young sons and first came to the U.S. in December 2022. They are seeking asylum, an arduous process. The application has been submitted and the necessary steps completed. Additionally, they have filed the paperwork to be able to obtain paid employment as non-citizens, again a complicated process. The family has received phenomenal support from our community as they seek to establish productive and independent lives in their new home. They are working hard to learn English and master the skills needed for a new country. Because they are not allowed to have paid employment, their full support depends on the generosity of our congregations. There are additional opportunities that exist for the family if the financial support is there, including a summer soccer program for their older son and a family summer camp for all of them. We as a congregation have the opportunity to bless this family as they seek safety and belonging in their new home. Our goal is \$3,000. Thank you for giving generously!
