


Monthly Mission

Notes from the Community & Global Missions Board

Our featured mission for August is Crossroads Campus Ministry at Minnesota State-Mankato. Crossroads traces its origins all the way back to a Lutheran club at Mankato State Teachers College over a hundred years ago! Bethlehem has had close ties with Crossroads over the years, and Pastor Jacie is on the Board currently. Crossroads sponsors several programs which address needs for student food support. Campus Kitchen, a food shelf, is even able to provide halal food as needed. "Lunch 4 a Buck" provides a weekly tasty meal rotated between four Lutheran churches, including BLC. Contact Jan Blaisdell if you're interested in volunteering. Crossroads has been without a designated pastor for the last year. There is a weekly Sunday night service using rotating local pastors during the school year. They are rebuilding programs post-COVID and have recently initiated a search for a new minister. There is a plan to expand services offered as staff grows. Our giving goal for August is \$1000. Thanks for supporting the physical, emotional, and spiritual needs of our students!

We are deep in the heart of summer, and the deficit has grown deeper as well. As of the end of June, the general fund deficit had reached \$38,247. While member giving has been steady at 94% of budget, there are several expenses that have been higher than budgeted. Mid-year contribution reports were mailed out in early July. Council Corner

Highlights from the Monthly Council Meeting

Here are the "highlights" of the Bethlehem Council meeting held on July 18. Meeting minutes with more details are posted at www.blcmankato.org and are also available in the church office notebook. Visit with Council members with questions and concerns! We welcome your conversation & feedback!

Finances: The general fund balance as of June 30 is a deficit of -\$38,247 as a result of higher expenses and less than 100% member giving. 6-month giving statements and a letter encouraging fulfillment and advance payment of pledges has been sent to BLC members. The Finance Committee and Council are monitoring this situation and are hopeful that a traditional summer deficit will be resolved by the end of the year. The mortgage balance now stands at \$686,278. An early principal payment of \$22,000 was made. The mortgage interest rate and monthly payments have been reset with financial adjustments made by the Finance Committee. Annual financial review process is being evaluated and updated.

LSS/REACH Lease & Facilities: New 5-year lease has been negotiated with LSS for its office space and the REACH. Lease rates will increase 2% each year after year 1. Facilities improvements to address humidity and bathroom renovation needs will be conducted by BLC.

Family Faith Formation: A successful summer Montana youth trip reported. The FFF comprehensive plan is being revised to address changing needs and priorities. Monthly young adult gatherings are being planned starting in September.

<u>Boards/Committees</u>: Revised **Finance Committee & Stewardship Board** responsibilities approved. New **Fair Trade** Committee responsibilities approved. These will guide the annual work of these groups. Annual lay staff performance reviews completed by pastor & **Personnel Committee** with positive outcomes. Facilities Board has developed a list of 5 needed short-term & long-term facilities projects. They will be investigated for costs and options. Welcome & Inclusion Board participated in Mankato Juneteenth events.

Council: Liaisons to BLC boards/committees & calendar of meetings approved. Plan on fall November 19 and spring April 21 for semi-annual meetings. 11 Council goals approved for 2023-24. Council will review 1 of the 5 strategic goals at each monthly meeting with background and progress to be presented. Council members to interview community leaders to fulfill strategic goal.

Pastors: Annual pastoral performance review process, timeline & questions approved for July & August. Continued support reported for Cruz family with WELCOME project. Pastors meeting monthly with REACH and LSS staff to build relationships. Good news for Pr. Jacie in securing a Mankato house with closing/moving plans scheduled for end of July!


Next Council Meeting: Tuesday, August 15. No June Council meeting scheduled.

Last month, seven youth along with two adults and myself took the train through North Dakota to spend a week together at Flathead Lutheran Bible Camp in Lakeside, Montana. I knew it would be a beautiful place and experience, but I wasn't quite prepared for how incredibly awe-inspiring it would be.

<u>An update on the Cruz family</u>: Andrea, Ariac, Randy and Kamil are doing well in their new Minnesota home! And our multi-congregational collaboration is also going very well! Now might be a good time to take stock of just how far we have all come... Those who have been spending the most time with Ariac and Andrea and their children can tell you the most about their amazing journey getting to know their new home. Ariac, Andrea and Randy have all been doing summer school, and when they are not in school, Ariac and Andrea have been getting additional tutoring from volunteers, and their English is coming along nicely! The boys keep busy playing, and perhaps their favorite mode of transportation this summer is their bikes? The biggest news of late is that the WELCOME team has helped the family to procure a law firm to assist them with the process of seeking asylum. (Hint - it's COMPLICATED!) Thanks to your donations, we have paid the retainer to the law firm who is in the process of helping both Ariac and Andrea complete applications for asylum. Once those are submitted, they will be able to apply for green cards for employment. The entire process will take a few years at best, and there are no guarantees of success but we remain hopeful.

But we also need to mention the success of our collaborative work as congregations! Seven months ago we said "let's try this" and we are proud of our success to date. Thanks to the many financial donations, we are able to help the family with the costs of rent and utilities on an ongoing basis. This is after we worked together to set them up with an entire household of necessities! Volunteers from each of our churches — Bethlehem, Christ the King, Grace, Calvary, and Messiah — are providing transportation, helping navigate the medical system, offering assistance and tutoring with school, procuring proper legal advice, and in general, being "family". Others are monitoring the financial needs, staying in touch with the Synod, and planning fundraising opportunities. It's a lot of people, a lot of work, and together, it's apparent we are all a part of "God's Work, Our Hands." We give thanks to God for this opportunity to serve, and to serve together!
